
Summer Reading Club

Worm Maze


Help the worm get to the center of the apple! Find your way through the maze.



River Crossing

A farmer needs to get a fox, a chicken, and a bag of corn across a river. The farmer has a rowboat, but it's only big enough to hold the farmer and one other thing (an animal or the bag of corn). If the fox and the chicken are left together, the fox will eat the chicken. If the chicken and the corn are left together, the chicken will eat the corn. How can the farmer get both animals and the bag of corn across the river safely?


If you like, cut out the pictures below to help you try out a variety of solutions.



- The farmer does the following:
1. Takes the chicken across the river and leaves it on the other side.
 2. Rows back across, picks up the bag of corn, drops it off on the other side, and picks up the chicken.
 3. Rows back across with the chicken, leaves the chicken on the shore, picks up the fox, and rows across the river.
 4. Leaves the fox on the shore with the bag of corn, rows back across, picks up the chicken, and rows across one final time.



Animals that Make Food

- Cows, goats, camels and yaks give milk
- Bees make honey
- Monkeys in Central and South America eat fruit from the cacao tree, then spit out the seeds that will grow into trees from which we get chocolate
- Birds, bats and other animals drop seeds that grow into cherry trees, vanilla plants and other fruit plants

Animals that Provide Clothing

- Sheep and alpacas provide wool
- Chinese silkworms provide silk
- Various animals provide fur or leather for clothing

Animals at Work

- Monkeys in Thailand climb palm trees to pick coconuts.
- Bedouin people in the Middle East use camel hair to make tents.
- Masai people in Tanzania use cattle dung to make their homes waterproof and keep termites away.
- People in India use dried cow manure to heat fires.
- Various cultures use animals' skins to build tents and houses.
- A bird called a honeyguide in Kenya will lead you to a bee nest full of honey.
- Dung beetles clean up after other animals' poop in Botswana, Africa.
- In the Central American rain forest, vines wrap around trees and strangle them, but the Cecropia tree survives because the Azteca ants that live in the tree clip away the vines, and save the tree.
- Swamp alligators dig out ponds when there is no rain, allowing frogs, fish and birds to survive during a drought.
- Many birds and insects pollinate plants so flowers and trees can grow.
